


## Corrigenda 2012 edition of “The World of Organic Agriculture”\*

**Page 25:** Global market 2009: 54.9 billion US dollars

**Page 48,** Graph 6: The figure for Asia 2010 should read 2.8 million hectares.

**Page 105:** Fully converted grape area in Chile is 3'859 hectares, the total fully converted area 97'619 hectares.

**Page 123:** The graph on the global market (figure 41) should read: North America 49 percent, Europe: 47 percent, Others: 4 percent.

**Page 139:** Second paragraph, second sentence: „In total, they certified 1'241'073 farms ...“

**Page 170.** First paragraph „Figures for 2010 indicate a reduction of 0.6 million hectares from previously reported wild harvest, organic aquaculture, and cultivated land .... First paragraph, last sentence: “Total organic acreage in 2010 is 92 percent of what it was in 2009, and organic agricultural land is 78 percent of the reported area for 2009.”

**Page 171:** First paragraph, last sentence: The total acreage of certified organic land is 2.3 million hectares of which 1.4 million hectares are for agriculture —a drop of more than 0.4 million compared to the 1.85 million hectares reported for 2008.

**Page 206/210:** Market growth in Germany was 2 percent.
